In Colorado, 78 percent of firearm deaths are suicides. Nearly half of all suicides involve the use of a firearm. This panel discussion, appropriate for the “Programs that Work” track, will expand participants’ views of emerging strategies in suicide prevention within the realm of firearm safety. Please join us for a robust discussion with this diverse panel of experts, including leading suicide prevention researchers, firearm advocates, mental health and suicide prevention advocates.
